City Election Day - Tuesday, November 8, 2011 Polls Open 7 a.m. - 8 p.m.

The City of Bowie will hold an election on Tuesday, **November 8, 2011** to elect members of the City Council consisting of a Mayor and six Councilmembers to hold office for a term of two years. Each registered voter may cast a total of four votes. All City voters may vote for Mayor and two at-large Councilmembers. Voters in each district may also vote for a district Councilmember.

For example, a registered voter living in the Kenilworth section of the City may vote for Mayor, two at-large Councilmembers, and one district Councilmember to represent District 2. While the entire City will elect the Mayor and two at-large Councilmembers, only the residents of a specific district may elect the Councilmember to represent that district.

Who Can Vote?

If you are a registered voter in Prince George's County and your voter registration card specifies your current City of Bowie address, you may vote in this City election. Only those registered to vote as of **October 7, 2011** may vote in this election. To determine if you are eligible to vote, please contact the City Clerk at 301-809-3029.

City Election News

Polling Places for 2011

The City is divided into four election districts. There are two polling places in each district. Voters must vote at the polling place assigned to their neighborhood. Polling places are different than those used for the general election and a couple of polling places have changed since the last City election. Please take a moment to review the list of neighborhoods assigned to each polling place on **Page 3**. Voters will also receive a postcard from the Prince George's County Board of Elections, indicating where they should vote in this City election.

Voters To Use Electronic Voting Machines

This November, City voters will vote using electronic touchscreen voting machines. These electronic voting screens are user friendly, easy to read and wheelchair accessible. They also have the potential to speed up the Election Day process because these machines will electronically tabulate votes. Voters may check out a sample machine at City Hall from October 27 to November 7.

Absentee Ballots Available

In accordance with Section 6-30 of the City Code, any qualified voter of the City who may be unavoidably absent from the City or who is otherwise prevented from being present and personally voting at the polls may apply for an absentee voting ballot. Applications are available from the City Clerk's Office at City Hall, or on the City's website, www.cityofbowie.org.

Application for an absentee ballot must be made in writing and signed by the applicant. If the applicant is unable to sign, the application must bear the mark of the applicant. The application must be presented to the City Board of Elections in person or by mail to 15901 Excalibur Road, Bowie, Maryland 20716, no later than 5 p.m. on November 7th.

When the application is received by mail, the City Clerk will issue the absentee voting ballot by return mail; when the application is presented in person, the City Clerk will issue the absentee voting ballot to the voter or duly authorized agent. Persons receiving absentee ballots will also be furnished official self-addressed return envelopes for use in returning the marked ballots. Only those ballots received in official return envelopes shall be counted and considered properly cast. All absentee ballots must be received by the Board of Elections by the closing of polls at 8 p.m. on November 8, 2011.

Need Help Getting to the Polls?

The Bowie Senior Center bus transportation service will be available for **seniors 55 and older, and for handicapped citizens**, for the City Election on November 8.

Shuttle service will be provided to the Pin Oak, Evergreen and Willows senior communities from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

For others, service will be provided from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Election Day. Please call the Senior Center at **301-809-2324** by Friday, November 4th to make arrangements.

Bowie Youth Chorus

Sign ups for the Bowie Youth Chorus will begin mid-November. The Youth Chorus will hold rehearsals on Thursdays at Kenhill Center, 2614 Kenhill Drive, beginning on February 2. All youth, grades 5 through 8, who live in Bowie or attend Bowie schools, are invited to join this musical group directed by Eleanor Minor and Assistant Director Mary Ann Jenkins. The Chorus is expanding to include a high school group, Summit Singers. High school youth, grades 9-12, are invited to try out for this audition-only performing musical group.

Both groups will rehearse on Thursdays at Kenhill Center. The Bowie Youth Chorus will meet from 5:30 to 7 p.m. and the Summit Singers from 7:30 to 9 p.m. Registration is \$50 for Bowie residents and \$55 for non-Bowie residents. There will also be a costume fee for all students.

Are You Prepared for the Next Emergency?

Between August 23rd when an earthquake shook the region, to the weekend of August 27 and 28 when Hurricane Irene paid a visit, to the flash flooding that occurred the following week when Tropical Depression Lee stalled over the DC area, Bowie has seen its share of emergency situations lately.

Hopefully, Bowie doesn't experience another disaster trifecta any time soon, but if there are lessons to be learned from this experience, it is that disasters can strike at any time, and that it is imperative that each of us take responsibility for our own personal preparedness.

Every household should have a personal plan for what you will do if you must leave your home, and an emergency supply kit. At the very least your kit should contain first aid items, a battery operated radio, a flashlight, water, and food that does not need to be refrigerated or cooked. More tips for personal preparedness are offered below.

Each of the three emergencies that occurred between August 23rd and September 7th had some impact in Bowie, especially for those who experienced extended power outages and flooding, but it was not catastrophic. We were fortunate this time. Next time, it could be different. Make sure that you have taken basic steps to keep you and your family safe and prepared.

No-Cost Preparations

- Create an emergency contact list.
- Decide where you will meet your family if you can't go home. Choose one place nearby and one further away.
- Decide now what you will do with your pet if there's an emergency – pet friendly hotels, friends, boarding kennels, etc.
- Make a visual inventory of your valuables. Take pictures or video.
- Scan important documents.
- Keep inventory and scanned documents on a disk in a safe deposit box or send to a friend or family member for safekeeping.
- Back up your computer.
- Check your homeowner's insurance policy. Know what coverage you have – what's your deductible, do you have actual cash value or replacement value coverage on your home? Do you have flood insurance or sewer backup protection?
- Have a "Go Bag" of essentials. What would you grab if you had five minutes to leave your home?
- Register for Alert Bowie to get important information and updates via text message and email.
- Get first aid and CPR training. Consider becoming a Bowie CERT (Citizen Emergency Response Team) volunteer.

Snow Removal

With winter upon us, please remember to remove your vehicles from the street if snow or ice is in the forecast. This will allow plows and/or salt and sand vehicles to more thoroughly treat your street.

A **Snow Emergency** is declared whenever snow reaches a depth of two inches. All vehicles must be removed from City streets. The City begins plowing when the snow depth reaches two inches. All main drives, hills and collector streets are treated and/or plowed first. Plowing continues until all streets have been cleared. In the event of a snowfall less than two inches, all main drives, hills and collector streets are treated with salt and/or sand. Streets and cul-de-sacs that are flat or have only slight inclines with limited intersections are only treated in extreme icing conditions. During a snow or ice event only, it is acceptable to park your vehicle on your grass.

Each resident and commercial property owner is responsible for removing snow and/or ice from the sidewalk in front of their property. Leaf Collection Begins

October 31

The City's leaf collection service kicks off October 31. Each residential neighborhood will have two collection dates. Residents should rake leaves into piles at the edge of their grass for pickup by the City crews. **Please do not rake leaves into the street.** Collection will take place from approximately 7:30 a.m. to 3 p.m., according to the schedule on Page 9.

Crews will work rain or shine. However, in the event of snow or ice storms, leaf collection will be temporarily suspended, as the trucks and crews will be redeployed to salt or plow City streets.

Some sections of the City are listed on two consecutive days. Due to expected volume, these sections may take more than one day to complete. The leaves must be raked to the curb by 7 a.m. on the first scheduled date. The second day is built into the schedule to allow extra time if it is needed. Crews will visit areas not completed on the first scheduled day.

Important Thoughts on Ash Trees in Bowie

Happy fall/winter! I trust you survived the dog days of summer, the earthquake, hurricane Irene, and the deluge of more than ten inches of rain in a three-day period in September!

I'm sure many of you have heard of the alert concerning the arrival in the last decade of the invasive insect known as the Emerald Ash Borer to our region. And you have probably seen some weird looking purple box-like structures (State of MD sampling traps) hung in ash trees throughout the City. This alert remains real and continues to determine the need for the quarantine that started in Prince George's and Charles Counties prohibiting the movement of any wood products across county lines. Since last year, this pest continues to spread geographically, and this quarantine has been extended to the entire western shore of Maryland. In other words, wood products such as firewood and wood chips cannot be moved from west of the Chesapeake Bay to the Eastern Shore of Maryland or over any state line. This is an effort by the State of Maryland to contain and eradicate this pest that destroys the ash trees in our area. So, here are some of the important things to know regarding this bad bug:

- It is not a native insect. It has mistakenly been imported from Asia with overseas shipments to the U.S. and Canada.
- So far, its one destructive target here in North America has been the highly valued ash trees (millions of them)!
- This bug came to our area in Maryland on an illegal shipment of ash trees from already-infested Michigan.
- Once found, a huge program was instituted by the State of Maryland to control the spread of this infestation by way of tree removals, monitoring, and quarantining affected areas such as ours, which continues today.
- While ash trees already had many insect and disease issues, this problem is the worst of all.

To identify the borer and its life cycle, please note: The adult beetles are bright green and are active in and around June - July, depending on weather conditions. They feed on the foliage of the tree. The females lay 60-90 eggs during this period which hatch in 7-10 days and quickly become larvae, chew through bark, and then tunnel under the bark throughout the infested area. At first, this puts the tree under stress, but soon cuts off the flow of water and nutrients which kills the tree. This process may take anywhere from two - four years. These tunnels or "galleries" can easily be seen when the loose bark is removed. This feeding and damage to the tree is completed in the fall and the pupae overwinter there. In or around April - May, the adults emerge through a D-shaped hole that is very distinct, and the cycle begins again.

Bowie's Tree Canopy

We all know how beautiful trees are this time of year when those vibrant yellows and reds are all around. We may not be so thrilled, however, at the thought of raking leaves when they land in our yards. Did you know that you do not need to rake them at all? What we may see as a waste product that we have to blow and bag or rake to the curb for pickup, Mother Nature sees as a natural fertilizer. In forests, leaves fall and decompose slowly and provide important nutrients to the soil. Since fall is the best time to fertilize, we can take a tip from nature and let our leaves fertilize our yards. Consider using your mulching or other lawnmower to chew up the leaves and let the shreds work their way into your grass.

Throughout the year, trees provide a multitude of benefits that we either may not realize or take for granted. In fact, the Arbor Day Foundation's website states that residents can save as much as 50% on air conditioning costs using properly situated shade trees, and healthy, mature trees can increase the value of a home by as much as 10%.

Perhaps more importantly, trees have tremendous benefits to the community and our watersheds as a whole. The City has more than 40% tree canopy that provides invaluable and often irreplaceable benefits to our environment, including:

- Stabilizing soil and stream banks,
- Reducing polluted stormwater runoff by intercepting and infiltrating rainfall,
- Reducing stream warming, and
- Providing a food source for the base of the stream ecosystem.

Despite the relatively high amount of existing tree canopy, the City's Planning Department is working with a consultant to develop a plan to increase tree canopy in the City even more because we know that trees are crucial to a healthy environment. We would like to see more trees out there, and it is not too late for you to help us meet this goal! The State provides a coupon for \$25 towards an approved tree at participating vendors. Visit www.trees.maryland.gov for more information and to print your coupon.

Disaster Planning for Your Pets

Recent flooding, earthquakes and Hurricane Irene have awakened our need to properly prepare for disasters. As we take steps to prepare for our families, we need to plan for the care and survival of our pets. Here are some planning tips.

Make a Pet Survival Kit

Your kit should include:

- A current color photograph of your pet in case you must search for a lost pet.
- Water and food supplies, a manual can opener, bowls and plastic bags.
- A leash/harness and a pet carrier or cage.
- A copy of all current vaccination and health records, license numbers and microchip numbers.
- Medication for your pet and a basic feeding and medication schedule.
- A first aid kit to care for your pet.
- A cotton sheet to put over the carrier (this calms pets and makes them feel more secure).

Other Pet Planning Suggestions

- Contact relatives outside the effected area to see if they would be willing to care for you and your pet(s).
- Ask your veterinarian or regular boarding facility if they provide shelter care for animals during times of emergencies and disasters.
- The order to evacuate can come at any time, even while you are away. Find a trusted friend or neighbor to take care of your pet(s) in this situation.
- Make a written disaster plan and be sure to include adequate provisions and evacuation sites.

Code Corner

Removal of Snow and Ice from Sidewalks and Driveways (City Code Sec. 14-22)

Qualified residents, apply now for the 24-hour snow and ice removal extension. Every owner or tenant of residential or commercial property which abuts a City sidewalk, or the paved area of their driveway if located within the public right-of-way, is required by City Code to remove or clear away any snow and ice from the sidewalk or driveway within forty-eight (48) hours after the cessation of any falling snow, sleet, or freezing rain. If circumstances (age, disability, illness, etc.) prevent an owner or tenant from removing the snow or ice within the forty-eight (48) hour period, an individual may apply for a twenty-four (24) hour extension. The twenty-four (24) hour extension does not exempt one from clearing snow and ice from the public sidewalks and driveway area. It only provides a waiver of the forty-eight (48) hour rule and grants a twenty-four (24) hour extension. The extension will permit the applicant seventy-two (72) hours (3 days) to comply with the City Code. It is strongly suggested that you make arrangements now with a company or individual for snow removal during the winter months. It will be more difficult to find someone once the snow/ice season has begun.

Qualified residents may apply for the 24-hour extension by submitting an application to the Code Compliance Office at City Hall, 15901 Excalibur Road, Bowie, MD 20716. The application is available on the City's website, www.cityofbowie.org/Forms/snowice_clearing_waiver.pdf. An application may also be obtained at City Hall or by contacting the Code Compliance Office at 301-809-3008 or lransom@cityofbowie.org. **Applications should be submitted before December 1, 2011.**

Vacant Properties

Residents of the City of Bowie are not immune to these difficult financial times. Some residents are struggling to maintain their jobs and provide adequate housing for their family. A few owners are abandoning their property or are forced from their home during foreclosure proceedings. Code Compliance Officers are working with property owners, financial institutions, and property preservation companies, to maintain the exterior of vacant homes and their exterior property areas. Public nuisance and public emergency violations are quickly resolved but court proceedings often delay enforcement of other less significant issues. If you know of a vacant property that is not being properly maintained, please contact the Code Compliance Office at 301-809-3008, or lransom@cityofbowie.org.

Rental License Program

New homebuyers and current property owners wishing to rent their homes should be aware of the City of Bowie Rental Licensing Program. All residential properties that are not owner-occupied must be licensed with the City of Bowie. An application for a License of a Rental Dwelling is available on the City's website, www.cityofbowie.org/Forms/Rental_License_Application.pdf or may be picked up at City Hall. Once the application is reviewed and the \$100 license fee accepted, a temporary rental license will be issued. An inspection of the rental property will be conducted. If no violations exist or violations are remedied, a rental license will be issued. The annual license fee for a single-family home is \$100 and an inspection of the property is conducted every 14 months.

Bowie Youth & Family Services

The mission of Bowie Youth & Family Services (BYFS) is to provide community-based mental health services for the families of the Bowie community, to improve understanding and communication between parents and youth, to prevent youth from entering the formal juvenile justice system, and to increase the safety of our community through drug and alcohol prevention activities. BYFS is dedicated to providing excellent professional services and innovative programming in order to help and support those citizens who are experiencing emotional difficulties and family stress.

BYFS believes that “every child deserves a seamless web of support—made up of parents, friends, neighbors, community, government, and the private sector through which no child will slip. It is everyone’s responsibility to help weave that web.”

Family counseling services are provided to residents within the corporate limits of the City of Bowie for \$20 per session, and to those in the greater Prince George’s County area for \$30 per session. Families with children up to age 18 are encouraged to call to make an appointment. Groups are offered for those who want guidance with parenting skills, social skills for young children, helping your children in coping with divorce, and a group for high school girls. Each group runs between four and eight weeks and varies from \$60 to \$120 per group. Call **301-809-3033** for more information.

When Belair at Bowie's residents settled in 1961, the iconic aluminum tree had arrived, and friends and family came to discover a new community. Fifty years later, icicle lights drip from gutters, holiday spaceships land in front yards, recipes for low-fat cookies and kugel abound, and zawadi gifts delight small residents. Family and friends still share the season's fun and fellowship.

Bowie's history is long...so are its evergrowing and everchanging holiday traditions. They reflect our history, our diversity – and the spirits of 266 holidays past – as we look forward to the next holiday season!
