

REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

MONDAY, MARCH 19, 2018

CALL MEETING TO ORDER:

The Regular Meeting of the Bowie City Council was held on Monday, March 19, 2018 in the Council Chambers at City Hall. Mayor Robinson called the meeting to order at 8:00 p.m.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG:

Mayor Robinson led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

QUORUM:

In attendance were Mayor Robinson, Councilmembers Esteve, Gardner, Glass (Arrived 8:04 p.m.), Marcos, and Trouth; City Manager Lott, Assistant City Manager Mears, City Attorney Levan, City Clerk Hernandez, City staff, the Press, and the Public.

CITIZEN PARTICIPATION:

- 1. Aaron Markavitch, Anacostia Trails Heritage Area Briefed Council on funding the City received for renovation of the exhibits at the stables.
- 2. Elveeda Dixon, Diversity Committee Chair Spoke about Women's History month.
- 3. M.L. Smith, Tilbury Lane Complimented the City on the smooth process of the recent election.
- 4. Fiona Moodie, Ithan Lane Thanked Bowie residents for their support on the Bowie Recall for District 2.
- 5. Jessie Blunt, Excalibur Road Spoke about theft concerns occurring at Pin Oak.
- 6. Andrew Roud, St. John's Properties Requested that the item on tonight's agenda in reference to the Retail Village East at the Melford Town Center be rescheduled to the next Council meeting on April 2, 2018.

PRESENTATIONS:

- A. Certification of March 12, 2018 City of Bowie District 2 Special Election Ms. Yolanda Jones, Chair of the Board of Elections read the report from the Board of Supervisors of Elections dated March 19, 2018, certifying the results of the March 12, 2018 Special Election which is attached hereto.
- B. Swearing-in of new District 2 Councilmember Dufour Woolfley Mayor Robinson swore-in Mr. Dufour Woolfley as the new District 2 Councilmember. Councilmember Woolfley thanked his wife and family for their support in this effort, also the other candidates, and the voters.

CITY BOARDS AND COMMITTEES:

- A. Appointments/Re-appointments/Swearing-in:
 - 1. Mayor Pro Tem Gardner moved the appointment of Catie Vandermeys as a member of the Green Team Executive Committee for a 2-year term. Councilmember Trouth seconded the motion and it carried 7-0.
 - 2. Mayor Robinson swore-in Ms. Vandermeys to her respective committee.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT:

City Manager Lott reported that department heads are in the final stages of preparing the FY 2019 budget for Council presentation next month and Public Works and Park & Grounds staff is preparing for hopefully the last storm of this winter.

CONSENT AGENDA:

Mayor Pro Tem Gardner moved the approval of Consent Agenda Items: A) Approval of Resolution R-12-18 Accepting Bid Proposal for Brick Paver Replacement in the Northridge Section; B) Approval of Resolution R-13-18 Accepting Bid for the Purchase of a Skid Loader; C) Approval of Resolution R-14-18 Waiving by a Two Thirds Vote, the Bidding Requirements of Section 61 of the City Charter and Authorizing the City Manager to Enter Into an Annual Support Agreement With Convergeone to Provide Managed Services on the Telephone System; D) Approval of Resolution R-15-18 Accepting a Bid Proposal for Whitemarsh Park, Phase 1 Installation of a Sanitary Sewer; E) Approval of Resolution R-16-18 Accepting a Bid Proposal for Water Main Interconnection in Heather Hills. Councilmember Marcos seconded the motion and it carried 7-0.

NEW BUSINESS:

A. Centennial Art Sculpture – Community Services Department, Project Manager Mr. Matt Reno introduced Mr. Charles Bergen the artist doing the Centennial Art Sculpture. This particular art project began in August 2016, the sculpture was to reflect Bowie's history and community as well as compliment the theme of the modern City Hall design and architecture and surrounding park. The sculpture will be a laser cut, welded and painted steel 3-panel design. The panels will represent the past, present and future of the City of Bowie.

Ms. Margaret Suddeth, representing the City's Arts Committee commented that the committee fully supports the design of the sculpture by Mr. Bergen and hopes Council supports their recommendation.

Councilmember Marcos made a motion to approve the design concept for the art sculpture. Councilmember Woolfley seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously.

- B. Retail Village East at the Melford Town Center Developer requested that this item be rescheduled to the April 2 Council Meeting. Council concurred.
- C. Police Department Update Police Chief Nesky and Deputy Chief Preston briefed Council on department statistics, programs and activities. The department is authorized at 65, and currently have 64 sworn officers. The Call Center began dispatching for emergency and non-emergency calls on December 11, 2017; number of calls taken since then is 7,113. Training for call takers to be certified as dispatchers is ongoing and expect to be completed by July. The department has held a series of Town Hall meetings throughout the City, they were well attended in some spots and not so well attended in others; they tried to go live over social media channel in some locations. The meetings intent was to

get feedback on issues that the community sees. The main concerns are traffic and speeding. The department also held an online survey to gather more information. Theft from autos is always an issue but the numbers have been going down unfortunately retail theft numbers are increasing. The opioid crisis is starting to peek its head in Bowie; officers continue to get training on it and are carrying NARCAM in vehicles for treatment. The department participated in several community events in the past 6 months that were very successful.

Councilmember Esteve asked if the department is getting any calls thru social media. Chief Nesky replied that they have not; they do have a disclaimer on the site that it is not monitored 24 hours.

Councilmember Esteve then asked what were the number of opioid cases responded to by the officers. Deputy Preston replied that to date they know of 5 but are working with the Fire Department to see how many they have responded to and get a better number.

Councilmember Glass asked if there are Safety Resource Officers in the elementary and middle schools. Chief Nesky replied that at the moment they only have one at the high school and the annex; one of things the department is looking at in their three year strategic plan is to see if its feasible to have a roaming resource officer for the elementary and middle schools.

Mayor Robinson thanked Chief Nesky and Deputy Chief Preston for their presentation.


ADJOURNMENT AND MOVE TO CLOSE SESSION:
